## **Chris Cargill** "Websites & Social Media" Program January 6<sup>th</sup>, 2025, at MWC Library

**Chris Cargill will be kicking off the New Year for MDAG at 6:30 pm on January 6<sup>th</sup>.** Chris developed and maintains the website (<u>www.edmondart.org</u>) for the Edmond Art Association (EAA). He also updates the EAA's social media presence. As both budding and professional artists we often have questions related to websites and social media. Is one better than the other?




Having both a website and social media is crucial in today's digital world. Each serves different but complementary functions, offering distinct advantages that help artists build a professional identity, grow their audience, and connect with fellow artists, potential buyers, collaborators, and fans. Here's why both are important:

- Website: Your website serves as a hub for your professional identity. It allows you to showcase your portfolio with high-quality images and detailed descriptions of your work, share your biography, and tell your story in a controlled, polished environment. You have complete ownership over the design, layout, and content, ensuring that everything aligns with your personal brand and aesthetic. You can set up an online store, publish blogs, and even offer newsletters or tutorials. It's an ideal place to provide information about your exhibitions, upcoming projects, and sales. The website is where people can get a more complete, organized view of your work and easily contact you.
- **Social Media**: Social media, on the other hand, allows you to present your personality and style in a more informal and dynamic way. It's an opportunity to engage in real time conversations, increasing visibility and building relationships. However, Social platforms are subject to algorithms and changing rules, therefore content can get buried in feeds, so you have less control over who sees it. Still, social media is great for exposure and can help you reach a broader, more immediate audience.

Chris will share information about the costs, how to get a domain name, hosting choices, and how easy it can be to create and make changes to both websites and social media. Over a year ago I (Susan Schmidt) called Chris to ask for advice on updating the MDAG website (www.mid-delartguild.com). He was gracious and spent at least an hour talking with me. It is a real pleasure to have him be our guest speaker as we plan to make changes to the MDAG website in 2025. Retired police officer Chris Cargill is a mural and mixed-media artist who lives and works in Edmond, Oklahoma. His style is influenced by a multitude of street artists and pop culture. He studied with several working artists in both Oklahoma and New Mexico. Chris has been selected as the Edmond Art Association's Artist of the Month numerous times.

Chris has participated in many group shows and festivals including those hosted by Girls Inc. in Santa Fe, New Mexico, DNA Galleries in Oklahoma City and the Downtown Edmond Arts Festival in Edmond, Oklahoma. Chris was named as the Featured Artist of the Downtown Edmond Arts Festival in 2016 and his Psyche mural was voted Edmond's Favorite Public Art piece in 2020. His work can be found in a myriad of public and private art collections both in the United States and abroad

# Thank You Joshua Brunet

Joshua S. Brunet was well prepared for his children's book illustration demo November 4<sup>th</sup>. Like cooking shows which have the ingredients ready to go and an extra cake in the oven, Joshua had his paintings at different stages ready to complete the next step. There was no waiting for layers to dry. The Edgar Allen Poe and Raven illustration is an example of his layering technique.



As a child from Detroit, Michigan, Joshua was fascinated with a love of history and American lore. His visits to Henry Ford's nearby Greenfield Village, an outdoor living museum, and his favorite TV show Reading Rainbow fed his imagination. The illustrations in Disney's movies and posters helped pave the way for Joshua to interpret history. He liked the smooth application of paint used by Disney animators. Joshua's illustration skills developed early in life. His first-grade art teacher recognized his talent and entered a map Joshua drew of Michigan in a competition. That teacher was an example of the many people who invested in his artistic aspirations. He thought all kids received such support. He was in grad school before he realized many young people don't receive the encouragement which he now provides to his students.

Joshua illustrated his first book in the fifth grade. The books he illustrates today require a lot more research to ensure the facts are correct. He enjoys the research too. For example, he was competing against other artists to illustrate a children's book about Monarch Butterflies. He learned most birds will not eat Monarch's as the butterflies are toxic. He changed his initial concept from a sparrow to the Black-headed Grosbeak, and received a perfect grade from the publisher's scientific advisor and got the contract for the book.

Oil paints generally take a long time to dry. His process is much faster which is helpful considering he may only have 4 months to illustrate a book. He generally uses Strathmore Bristol Board and prefers Vellum Finish as it is rougher to grab the Prismacolor pencils. Joshua said painting from live models is ideal but he takes photos, from all directions, even sides of the model he doesn't expect to use. He follows Norman Rockwell's example and takes hundreds of photos. Like Rockwell, he asks his models to exaggerate their expressions. Taking videos of the models also helps capture the mood and the shadows which he may refer to in the planning stage. Never know what view you might need.



Joshua may start with a brown oil wash (burnt sienna and orderless mineral spirits) like the above illustration where he intentionally shows the brush strokes over a light drawing to give the impression of movement. He then applies a layer of Elmers Glue to act as a plastic separation. Once the glue is dry, he can add the soft colored pencils and acrylic layers to build up the design. That separation allows Joshua to wipe back to the glue layer if desired. He works from thin to thick and from dark to light. The Prismacolors he usually prefers for skin tones are Clay Rose and Rosy Beige. **For more** 



details on his process, he said to check out Brunet Illustration on Instagram which include videos of his demonstrations to his students. It is possible to earn \$10,000 plus 5% royalties to illustrate a book, though he says he gets less.

Joshua was very complimentary of Bill Schmidt's setup to project his paintings on the overhead screen in the library auditorium. He plans to ask Oklahoma Baptist University to pay for a similar setup for his classroom. It sure beats the mirror MDAG used at Rose State College. Twenty-six people attended Joshua's excellent demo. Thanks again! "NOTE: The winner of the Member's Choice is not eligible to enter again for one month but can enter for Judge's Choice at any meeting.
